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Letter from the director

Dear supporters and advocates of quality local news and information,

Again this year, due to the continued support of our partners, grantees, funders, and the State of NJ, we've been able to significantly expand our reach and deepen our impact in communities throughout New Jersey.

In 2024, we awarded \$3 million to a diverse group of grantees, and our average new grant has grown from \$80,000 to \$82,000, and renewal grants from \$84,000 to \$97,000, still less than needed for ensuring financial sustainability, but a significant boost for start-up and early-stage local news outlets.


Each grantee is working to address the unique needs of their communities. These projects range from hyperlocal news outlets filling gaps in coverage, to student-run publications training the next generation of journalists, to investigative reporting that holds local governments accountable. We are thrilled to see the meaningful contributions our grantees have made, many of which are BIPOC-led, representing the diversity of our state and ensuring that more voices are heard.

But we need your help. We need to raise much-needed funds to keep the momentum going.

Just Google "the loss of local news" to see for yourself. It's not good for you, nor for our society or democracy, which can only thrive when the flow of news and information is robust and reflective of the diverse places in which we live.

It's why the New Jersey Civic Information Consortium exists: To meet the evolving local news and information needs of New Jersey communities, with a particular focus on news deserts and historically marginalized areas. The Consortium envisions a future in which every person in New Jersey has access to accurate, timely, and representative local news and information that enhances their lives and communities.

Highlights of 2024

Blue Engine Technology & Sustainability Accelerator

The Consortium launched a **Technology & Sustainability** Accelerator in December of 2023, bringing together a cohort of 21 news organizations. With quidance from expert coaches at Blue Engine Collaborative, these organizations applied performance-driven change principles to address key strategic challenges in their digital businesses. In the process, they also gained comprehensive expertise in managing successful local news outlets.

This cohort was a great success and resulted in \$121,000 in overall revenue growth and an average 300% increase in audience for the cohort.

New Jersey Documenters

The Consortium funded the implementation of three Documenters host-sites across the state aimed at promoting civic engagement and transparency in communities. Documenters, powered by City Bureau, based in Chicago, is an innovative initiative that trains and pays community members to attend and document public meetings and publish the results.

The three host-sites are in New Brunswick, Newark, and at Atlantic Cape Community College.

The NJ Documenters program has successfully trained more than 50 Documenters across the state. More than half of the participants identify as BIPOC and as women or nonbinary, underscoring the program's dedication to fostering diverse voices in local civic engagement and journalism.

Press Forward New Jersey

The Consortium and the Community Foundation of New Jersey (CFNJ) were announced as the home to the New Jersey chapter of Press Forward. This partnership marks an important step in the advancement of local news and civic engagement across the Garden State.

Press Forward is a national movement to strengthen American democracy by revitalizing local news and information. A coalition of funders is investing more than \$500 million over five years to strengthen local newsrooms, close longstanding gaps in journalism coverage, advance public policy that expands access to local news, and scale the infrastructure the sector needs to thrive.

Press Forward Locals are a network of chapters across the country where funders bring new donors and foundations together to expand resources for local news. These chapters are an opportunity for funders to create place-based and topically-based initiatives, driven by the specific information needs of their communities.

Poll

The Consortium commissioned a poll from the <u>Eagleton Center</u> for Public Interest Polling at Rutgers University and SSRS, which focused on local news in New Jersey. The poll revealed that Search engines such as Google were by far the most popular source from which New Jerseyans said they get local news, followed by local newspapers and local television stations. When it comes to social media. Facebook is the dominant source for news.
